

# WHAT SHOULD I DO DURING GREAT LENT?

Most of us can readily identify what we should do during Great Lent: pray, fast, and give alms. It's the hows that sometime elude us!

- 1. Turn off the TV, the phone, and the Internet except for news, weather reports, and educational programs. Use e-mail for necessary things...period! Leave your iPod and Blackberry at home. Like the Prophet Elijah, listen for the Lord's voice in life's still, quiet moments.
- 2. Avoid engaging in outside activities for their own sake. Keep useless talking to a minimum. Focus on necessary business, acts of charity, your children and family, and strengthening your relationships with others, especially those with whom you have experience conflicts in the past. Get beyond what others do and discover who they are.
- 3. Question yourself with regard to love, truth, honesty, purity, humility, peace, forgiveness, justice, mercy, hungering and thirsting for God, wisdom and knowledge. What role do these virtues play in your life?
- 4. In the name of Jesus Christ, forgive everyone who has offended you, and seek forgiveness from those whom you have offended. If it will not be embarrassing or misinterpreted as an act of self-righteousness, express yourself as concretely- and personally- as possible. Visit, make a phone call, send a hand-written note, or do whatever it takes to tear down those walls that so often separate us from others.
- 5. Set aside a sizeable portion of your resources for others- your parish, the poor and needy, a homeless shelter or food depository...whatever. Or transform your "me time" into "thee time" by volunteering to help with those ever-present tasks around your parish or a social agency in your area. Don't tell anyone what you are doing. Ask nothing in exchange- even receipts.
- 6. Fast strictly and regularly- from food, from distractions, from passions, and from sinful behaviors. Suit your fast to your work schedule, but avoid luxury. Do not advertise or discuss your fasting with anyone, and avoid those endless discussions on "Lenten chocolate cake" or "how to make tofu taste like turkey" or "vegetable oil vs. olive oil", that miss the point and spirit of fasting altogether.

- 7. Pray at home at least at one fixed time every day. Choose a brief rule of prayer and stick to it. Participate in all the Lenten services especially St. Basil's Divine Liturgy on Sundays. Confess seriously, sincerely, and with the utmost preparation.
- 8. Read the Scriptures regularly. Follow the Church's daily calendars of readings, or focus on one chapter of a given book. Reflect especially on 1 John, Romans 12-14, Matthew 5-7, and John 14-17.
- 9. Be faithful to Christ's Gospel in every word, action, and thought- even the smallest or most insignificant. Master those "little things," knowing that God will bless you with things that are far greater!

## WHAT DO WE COMMEMORATE ON THE SUNDAYS DURING LENT?

**APRIL 7:** On this 3rd Sunday of Lent, the Cross on which Christ died is honored, the most important Sunday of Great Lent. This is the half-way point of the long journey of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving. The Veneration of the Holy Cross reminds the faithful how Jesus carried the cross, letting no obstacle prevent Him from carrying it to the end. It is the same with the life of the Christian during Lent. Pascha (Easter) is reached only through the crucifixion of one's passions. A cross is carried in procession to the middle of the church during the Divine Liturgy and left there all week for veneration as a symbol of strength.

**APRIL 14:** This being the 4th Sunday of Lent, the Church commemorates St. John Climacus (6th century) who is the writer of the book called "The Ladder of Paradise." This book contains 30 chapters, with each chapter as a step leading up to a faithful and pious life as the climax of a Christian life. The spirit of repentance and devotion to Christ dominates the essence of this book, along with the monastic virtues and vices. He was an ascetic and writer on the spiritual life as a monk-abbot of Sinai Monastery. These steps of the ladder as set forth by St. John are to be practiced by the Christian especially during this period of Lent. Each step leading to the top step of the ladder, is the climactic essence of the true meaning of a Christian life.

**APRIL 21:** This 5th Sunday commemorates the life of St. Mary of Egypt, who is a shining example of repentance from sin through prayer and fasting. She lived a sinful life for many years, but was converted to a Christian life. She went into the wilderness to live an ascetic life for many years, praying and fasting in repentance of her life from sin to holiness through repentance. Her understanding of repentance involved not a mere change from small things in her life, but an extreme change of her entire attitude and thoughts. The Church commemorates St. Mary of Egypt for her recognition of her own sins as an example of how one can free oneself from the slavery and burden of wrongdoings. This recognition of sin is imperative during Lent for the faithful as a means of self-examination and preparation for a more virtuous life in anticipation of the Crucifixion and the Resurrection of Christ.

**APRIL 27:** an interlude between Lent and Holy Week, the Church names this day the "Saturday of Lazarus" in remembrance of the resurrection of Lazarus told in the Gospel of John (11:1-45) and its promise of universal resurrection for all men. The Church connects this celebration, by anticipation, with the Entrance of Christ into Jerusalem (Palm Sunday).

APRIL 28: Palm Sunday celebrates the glorious and brilliant feast of the Entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem (John 12-1-18). Zechariah had prophesied the entrance of the Messiah into Jerusalem saying: "Rejoice greatly...O daughter of Jerusalem; behold, the King comes unto you; He is just, and having salvation; lowly, and riding upon an ass, and upon a colt the foal of an ass", (Zech. 9:9). The contemporary Jews associated this prophecy with the

O Lord and Master of my life!


Take from me the spírít of sloth, faint-heartedness, lust of power, and idle talk.

# HOW TO PUT TOGETHER A TRADITIONAL EASTER BASKET





PASCHA - The Easter Bread (Pron. Pa-ska.) A sweet yeast bread rich in eggs, butter, etc. Symbolic of Christ Himself who is our True Bread. Usually round loaf baked with a golden crust decorated with a symbol indicative of Christ. Sometimes a cross (+) of dough is placed on top encircled by a plait given it a crowned effect or Greek

CHEESE - (Rusyn: Hrudka or Sirec) A custard type cheese shaped into a ball having a rather bland but sweet taste indicative of the moderation that Christians should have in all things. Also creamed cheese is placed in a small dish and both are decorated with symbols (see Pascha) out of cloves or pepper



HAM - (Rusyn: Šunka - pron. shoon-ka.) The Flesh meat popular with the Slavs as the main dish because of its richness and symbolic of the great joy and abundance of Easter. Some may prefer Lamb or Veal. This is usually well roasted or cooked as well as other meats so the festivity of the day will not be burdened with preparation and all may enjoy the Feast.





SAUSAGE (Rusyn: Kolbasi-pron. kolbus-i.) A spicy, garlic sausage of pork products indicative of God's flavor and generosity.



BUTTER - (Rusyn: Maslo pron. ma-slo.) This favorite dairy product is often shaped into a figure of a Lamb or small cross and decorated as the cheese. This reminds us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things.







EGGS (Rusyn: Pisanki pron. pi-sun-ki) Hardboiled eggs brightly decorated with symbols and markings made with beeswax, indicative of new life and resurrection. Red eggs are also traditional date back to a story with St. Mary Magdalene. Having been dyed with onion skins saved over the past year, red shows the color of life and victory that came through Christ's blood.



SALT - (Rusyn: Sol' pron. sol') A condiment necessary for flavor reminding the Christian of his duty to others.



HORSERADISH (Rusyn: Chrin pron. khrin) Horseradish mixed with grated red beets (optional) symbolizes the Passion of Christ still in our minds but sweetened with some sugar because of the Resurrection. A bitter-sweet red colored mixture reminds us of the sufferings of Christ.

These articles are placed in a wicker basket. A decorated candle is placed inside and is lit at the time of the blessing. A linen cover usually embroidered with a picture of the Risen Christ or symbol with the words "Christ is Risen" is placed over the food when brought to the Church.

In some places a large Easter Bread (Pascha) is made and brought separately in a large linen cloth. If the origin of the people was from a wine growing area, a sweet wine may be brought
